How do we do this? We provide grants and mentoring to young people with ideas for change with a significant social or environmental impact.

We know that our rangatahi will inherit the world and we want to give them the best chance to do so, through visionary projects.

Our Origin story

In 2020, our founder, Rebecca Mason, a leadership coach with over two decades of experience in working with people to be their best, looked around the world and felt she could be doing more.

Rebecca has always connected with young people who wanted to make a difference, calling them "young people with the light of vision in their eyes".

She saw young people becoming involved in multiple initiatives, including those around climate change. So she looked for a way to support them with these projects, hence the Kāmahi Trust was born.



Our Work

Since 2020 the Kamahi Trust has supported a number of rangatahi and their projects, such as:

- **Providing support** for a student to attend the International Chemistry Olympiad.
- **Providing a grant** for a student to enhance the digital footprint of national social and environmental projects being undertaken.
- **Providing ongoing mentoring** and grants to a project to support refugee students in schools by providing their backpacks with all the equipment needed.

Why Kāmahi?

The Kāmahi is a quiet achiever. It's a little-known tree that is thought to be the most abundant forest tree in New Zealand. It produces many seedlings; a metaphor for what's possible through a Trust designed to support young people. Kāmahi is a nursery species, meaning it creates the right environment for the taller tree species to grow – again, a perfect metaphor for the Trust.
